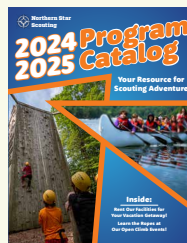

ROADMAP TO SUCCESS

Northern Star Scouting's Roadmap to Success (Roadmap) is a local unit recognition program. This program is used to recognize our units for their performance throughout the Scouting year.

The Roadmap is a points-based system where a unit earns points based on actions performed or metrics hit during the year. The actions that are a part of the program are key year to year behaviors that increase the success and performance level of the unit, such as creating a budget, a calendar, etc. These actions provide a healthy "Roadmap" for unit leaders to follow through the year. The metrics measured as part of the program are key metrics for a healthy unit such as membership or advancement.

During the process of creating the Roadmap program, there were a few important thoughts put into every objective, including keeping the program simple and straightforward. We don't need a very complicated system to recognize your unit. We also don't need large amounts of data. There will be some, but far less than in previous iterations of this program. Second, every objective in the program is good for the unit. Every goal directly benefits your unit.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

There are 8 total objectives that fall into 4 categories: Planning, Membership, Program, and Leadership (2 objectives per category). Each objective can earn you 50, 100, or 200 points. Based on the number of points accumulated during the year, your unit can earn Bronze, Silver, or Gold (scores for each level vary by program level). Every unit has the ability to earn Bronze simply by following the Roadmap's "action" oriented goals. Objectives like creating a budget or program plan.

RESOURCES

Responses to Registration Assistance Fee requests will include a link to register the new youth member or renew the registration of a current youth member and the discount code to use for the discounted registration fee.

YOUTH PROTECTION POLICIES

SCOUTING'S POLICIES TO KEEP KIDS SAFE

Scouting's rules for keeping children safe apply to all Scouting volunteers and all youth members, whether during a Scouting event or activity OR a non-Scouting event, unless the youth is a member of the leader's family. Here is a partial list. Full details can be found online www.northernstar.org/guidelines-for-safety as well as in the Guide to Safe Scouting. Adults are defined as 18 and older in all programs.

Two-deep leadership - Two registered adult leaders, 21 years or older, are required on all trips and outings. A registered female adult leader 21 years of age or over must be present for any activity involving female youth.

Adult Supervision/Coed Activities - Male and female adult leaders must be present for all overnight coed Scouting trips and outings, even those including parent and child. Both male and female adult leaders must be 21 years of age or older, and both must be registered members. All adults staying overnight in conjunction with a Scouting activity must be currently registered in an adult fee-paying position (excluding merit badge counselors) or as an adult program participant. For Cub Scout programs, Cub Scout parents or legal guardians taking part in an overnight Cub Scout program with their own child or legal ward are not required to register as leaders.

No one-on-one contact - One-on-one contact between adults and youth members is not permitted during or outside of Scouting events. In situations that require personal conferences, such as a Scoutmaster's conference, the meeting is to be conducted in view of other adults and youth. Scouting volunteers are prohibited from one-on-one contact with a Scout (who is not a family member) outside of official Scouting events.

Respect of privacy - Adult leaders must respect the privacy of youth members in situations such as changing clothes and taking showers at camp, and intrude only to the extent that health and safety require. Adults must protect their own privacy in similar situations.

Separate accommodations - When camping, separate accommodations for adult males and females and youth males and females are required. In Cub Scouting, parents and legal guardians may share a tent with their son or daughter. When two youth share a room or tent, they should be no more than 2 years apart in age and the same gender. When separate facilities are not available, separate times for male and female use should be scheduled and posted for showers. Lodging/Cabin Accommodations — whenever possible, separate cabins or lodging should be provided for male and female adults as well as for male and female youth. Where separate accommodations cannot be provided due to group size or limited availability, modifications may be made. Where

completely separate accommodations are not available, additional supervision is required.

Buddy System used at all times - The Buddy System is a safety measure for all Scouting activities. Buddies should know and be comfortable with each other and be the same gender. Self-selection with no more than two years age or significant differences in maturity should be strongly encouraged. When necessary, a buddy team may consist of three Scouts. No youth should be forced into or made to feel uncomfortable by a buddy assignment.

Appropriate use of smart phones, cameras, imaging, or digital devices - Although most Scouts and leaders use cameras and other imaging devices responsibly, it is easy to unintentionally or inadvertently invade the privacy of other individuals with those devices. The use of any device capable of recording or transmitting visual images in or near shower houses, restrooms, or other areas where privacy is expected is inappropriate.

Hazing and bullying prohibited - Physical or emotional hazing, bullying, and initiations are prohibited and may not be included as part of any Scouting activity.

No secret organizations - Scouting does not recognize any secret organizations as part of its program. All aspects of the Scouting program are open to observation by parents and leaders.

Constructive discipline - Discipline used in Scouting should be constructive and reflect Scouting's values. Corporal punishment is never permitted.

Junior leader training and supervision - Adult leaders must monitor and guide the leadership techniques used by youth leaders and ensure that Scouting policies are followed. With separate sleeping/showering accommodations, youth leaders are key to expectations of appropriate behavior.

Mandatory Reporting of Child Abuse - All persons involved in Scouting must report to local authorities any good faith suspicion or belief that any child is or has been physically or sexually abused, physically or emotionally neglected, exposed to any form of violence or threat, exposed to any form of sexual exploitation including the possession, manufacture, or distribution of child pornography, online solicitation, enticement, or showing of obscene material. This duty cannot be delegated to any other person. See page 48 for steps to reporting child abuse.



No one-on-one contact between an Adult and Youth includes emails, text, social media, and phone calls. Always include another adult on all digital communications.

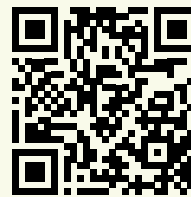

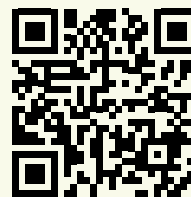

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

HURON DISTRICT

The Huron District offers after-school programs that operate in various schools, housing communities, and recreation centers throughout our territory. The mission of the Huron District is to offer Scouting opportunities to underserved communities. The programs focus on citizenship, character development, and a positive attitude through fun and adventurous programming designed to engage, enrich, and excite.

POLARIS DISTRICT

The Polaris District offers Scouting programs that operate in various special needs and disabilities-focused day programs, service facilities, and schools in Minneapolis, St. Paul, and the surrounding suburbs. The mission of the Polaris District is to provide positive experiences for people of all ages and abilities in the special needs and disabilities community. The programs focus on cognitive skills through hands-on, interactive activities, designed to build character development and social skills.

SPECIAL NEEDS & DISABILITIES COMMITTEE

This committee is a group of dedicated volunteers with personal and professional experience in working with youth with Special Needs and Disabilities. This group works with all districts and in collaboration with other council committees to provide training and resources to educate and engage NSS leaders, volunteers and staff to ensure understanding and inclusion for youth of all abilities.

JUVENILE DIVERSION PROGRAM

The Juvenile Diversion Program offers services through program partnerships with police departments and youth-oriented organizations. The mission of the Juvenile Diversion Program is to help youth who have run into trouble with the law, or may be at risk to do so, by offering a positive alternative to formal court proceedings for first-time juvenile offenders who have committed a misdemeanor or status offense. Youth participate in Scouting activities through group interactions which are intended to improve their understanding and perception of the legal system and law enforcement, increase their self-esteem, teach them better methods of communication, and improve their decision-making skills.

COMMUNITY SCOUTING

We offer Scouting experiences to the entire community through several programs that are open to all, including our Base Camp and Leadership Center offerings and use of our camps and facilities by outside groups. Schools are our biggest users, typically reaching more than 11,000 students in more than 200 groups at Base Camp, with our inclusive Discovery Camps reaching over 1,100 community guests. In all, Northern Star Scouting serves approximately 20,000 Community Scouting participants each year.

EXPLORING

WHAT IS EXPLORING?

Exploring is a career education program for those who are 14 (and have completed the eighth grade) through 20 years of age. Exploring's purpose is to provide experiences to help young people mature and prepare them to become responsible and caring adults. Exploring is based on a dynamic and unique relationship between youth and the organizations in their communities. Local businesses initiate an Explorer post by matching their people and program resources to the interests of the community's youth.

RELIGIOUS HOLIDAY PLANNING POLICY

The twelfth point of the Scout Law states that a "Scout is Reverent. A Scout is faithful in the pursuit of religious duties, and respects the convictions and beliefs of others." In order to set this example at the district and council levels, the following religious holidays should be observed by all districts and council committees when setting dates and holding events. No council or district meetings or events can be held on or over: **Rosh Hashana (starts and ends at sundown), Yom Kippur (starts and ends at sundown), Christmas, Easter.**

Many other religious holidays from the Christian, Jewish and Islamic faiths are printed in this Council Calendar. These dates are taken from the National Office (of the Scouting America) calendar, and are provided as guidance for units and districts when considering the religious obligations of their members and prospective members.

UNIT SUPPORT

Council committees support and enhance the Scouting experiences of members and leaders, as well as keep Scouting thriving today and into the future. Listed here are the primary committees and a brief description. 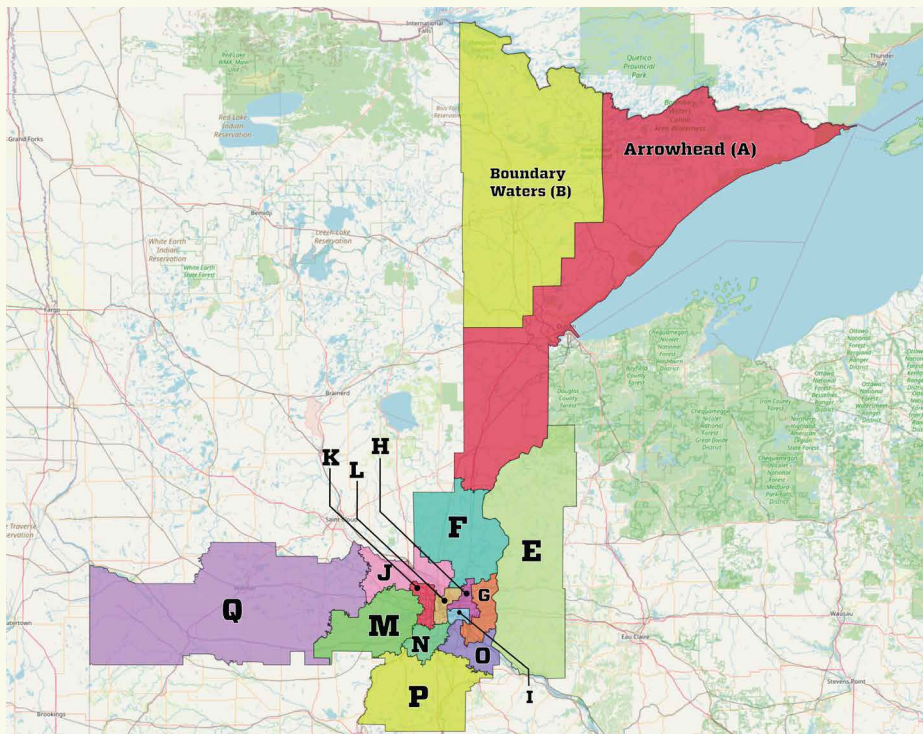

ORDER OF THE ARROW (TOTANHAN NAKAHA LODGE #16)

The Order of the Arrow (OA) recognizes Scouts and Scouters who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives. Members maintain camping traditions and spirit, promoting year-round and long-term resident camping, and provide cheerful service to others. OA service, activities, adventures, and training for youth and adults are models of quality leadership development and programming that enrich and help to further Scouting opportunities for youth.

In Northern Star Scouting, the OA program is facilitated by the Totanhan Nakaha Lodge. Our lodge has been active in the community since 1924 and offers program year-round. Follow the QR code below to be directed to our lodge website for more information, our event calendar, and event registrations. Also, look at the breakdown below that describes some of our lodge's events and programs.



National Order of the Arrow Conference (NOAC): Held every two years, this is the national gathering of all OA lodges from across the country. Attendance is typically around 6,000-8,000 for each event.

Section Conclave: Annual conclave that includes all six lodges that make up Section G-11. The host lodge rotates on a yearly basis.

Lodge Leadership Development (LLD): A lodge conference held annually in December to train officers, committee members, or any youth member who wishes to learn about chapter and lodge operations.

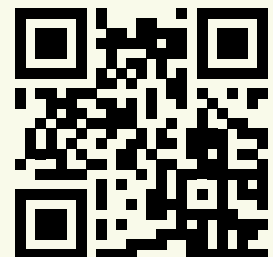
Lodge Fall Fellowship: A dinner, lock-in, or campout for all lodge members held in the Fall.

Lodge Spring Fellowship and Recognition: A dinner, lock-in, or campout for all lodge members held in the Spring. This event also serves as the annual recognition ceremony for lodge members.

Conclaves: Annual event that provides service to camp and serves as the backdrop for Ordeal and Brotherhood inductions.

Civic Service: Annually, the lodge helps to coordinate a variety of service events. The most popular service event that the lodge coordinates is the annual Ft. Snelling National Cemetery Wreath Clean-up that occurs the first Saturday in February.

Order of the Arrow High Adventure: Discounted opportunities for youth to experience High Adventure Bases while conducting environmental stewardship projects.

KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE

HERE ARE THREE IMPORTANT MESSAGES ON YOUTH PROTECTION TO KNOW AND SHARE:

1. Child sexual abuse is a societal issue that extends beyond any one institution or organization.

The statistics are startling. According to the National Center for Disease Control and Prevention, about 1 in 4 girls and 1 in 13 boys experience child sexual abuse at some point in childhood. Locally, the MN Department of Human Services' "Minnesota's Child Maltreatment Report, 2020" states that there were 5,048 reports of child sexual abuse.

2. Scouting is committed to being part of the solution and we are in a position to help.

Child safety experts have repeatedly called Scouting's youth protection policies and practices the "gold standard" for youth-serving organizations. Nationally and locally, Scouting shares its expertise with a wide variety of other organizations. Scout leaders and parents make all kids safer as they apply our youth protection training and practices in other parts of our community.

3. Kids are safe in Scouting.

We have always had a strong record compared to the larger community, but since the implementation of two-deep leadership in 1987, sexual abuse has been practically eliminated in Scouting. We work diligently toward its total elimination by ensuring that our programs incorporate the latest and best youth protection practices.

SCOUTING KEEPS KIDS SAFE THROUGH A MULTI-LAYERED PROCESS OF SAFEGUARDS

Youth Protection Training

Mandatory volunteer training with educational materials for parents and Scouts featured in handbooks and integrated into programs. Our 6,600+ volunteers were trained in youth protection.

Formal Leadership Selection Process

Including criminal background checks and other screening efforts.

Two-Deep Leadership Policy

Requires two adults present with youth at all times and prohibits one-on-one situations between adults and youth in-person or electronically, within or outside of our program.

Mandatory Reporting

All persons involved in Scouting must report to local authorities any good-faith suspicion or belief that any youth is being, or has been, physically or sexually abused.

Volunteer Screening Database

A tool the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends for all youth-serving organizations, to prevent individuals that were removed from their organization from re-registering (Scouting has had this in place since the 1920's).

The CDC reports that about 1 in 4 girls and 1 in 13 boys experience child sexual abuse at some point in childhood.

WHY?

- It promotes goodwill between Scouting and your local community.

WHAT ARE NEWSWORTHY IDEAS?

- Community service projects.
- Advancements/special achievements (awards ceremonies, Eagles and Eagle projects).
- Special events such as a high-adventure trip, a pinewood derby, unique field trip or camp/activity.
- Unit fundraising events such as a popcorn sale, pancake breakfast, or car wash.
- Firsts – such as some of the firsts for those units that have welcomed girls.

GENERAL TIPS

- Keep it local – Community media is all about local people and events.
- Include contact information for people who want to join your group.
- Read your local paper & website – See the type of stories covered, editors/reporters to contact, publications schedules and deadlines.
- Use electronic format – Submit your releases, captions, fact sheets and photos electronically. Attach the document and photos as individual JPEG files or upload as requested on the media website.

TRAINING

FOUR STEPS TO A SUCCESSFUL AND REWARDING VOLUNTEER EXPERIENCE

STEP ONE:

YOUTH PROTECTION TRAINING (YPT) is required to register and must be renewed every two years. This protects children, adult leaders, and the organization by maintaining high vigilance on the important subject and methods of youth protection. YPT is completed online at: my.scouting.org.

STEP TWO:

POSITION-SPECIFIC TRAINING is required to be considered "Trained" in Scouting America. This training can be completed entirely online by Cub Scout Leaders, Venturing leaders, and Committee members at: my.scouting.org or in person. In-person trainings are led by experienced leaders who can directly answer questions, and they are well versed on local council and national resources. Scoutmasters and Assistant Scoutmasters must also take the in-person overnight training "Introduction to Outdoor Leadership Skills" outlined below in Step #3 and Hazardous Weather Training on my.scouting.org to be considered trained. Visit www.northernstar.org/training for more information.

STEP THREE:

BEING PREPARED FOR THE OUTDOORS is essential for all Scouting leaders.

Cub Scout Leaders - Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation (BALOO) is a combination of an online and instructor-led course of camping policies, taught along with the necessary tools to help packs carry out a successful camping experience. Completion of this course is mandatory for at least one adult on a pack overnighter. Northern Star provides several opportunities annually for volunteers to participate in this training.

Scouts BSA Leaders - Intro to Outdoor Leader Skills (IOLS) is required for Assistant Scoutmasters and Scoutmasters to be considered trained in their position. This hands-on training course provides adult leaders the practical outdoor skills they need to lead Scouts in the outdoors. Upon completion, leaders will feel comfortable teaching Scouts the basic skills required to obtain the First Class rank. GREAT LEADERS START WITH TRAINING! Northern Star holds IOLS Training throughout the year.

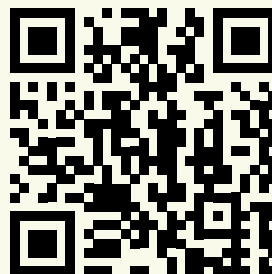

YOUTH LEADERSHIP TRAINING

GREY WOLF — NATIONAL YOUTH LEADERSHIP TRAINING (NYLT)

Grey Wolf is Northern Star Scouting's National Youth Leadership Training. A one-week program for Scouts BSA and Venturers held in June and July, at Fred C. Andersen Scout Camp and Camp Horace Johnson, replicates the first three weeks of typical unit operations, including patrol leader's council meetings, troop/crew meetings, patrol meetings, and planning for a big event. Becoming a better leader is the theme, but many aspects apply to daily life. Scoutmasters and Crew Advisors nominate youth to attend this training.

SCOUTS BSA AND VENTURING YOUTH LEADERSHIP COLLEGE AT UNIVERSITY OF SCOUTING is a day of leadership training that is aimed at educating new youth leaders. Our Quest for Leadership program will focus on the tips and tricks for youth to be successful in their leadership role.

ADULT TRAINING AWARDS

SCOUTER'S TRAINING AWARDS

Recognition awards are available to leaders who complete training, tenure, and performance requirements. Scouters earning the Training Award in one program area **MUST** complete ALL requirements (including tenure) for subsequent training awards in other program areas.

UNIT LEADER AWARD OF MERIT

Quality unit leadership is the key to a quality unit program—and it leads to better Scout retention. Scouting America has created the Unit Leader Award of Merit to recognize the quality unit leaders who make that happen.

SCOUTER'S KEY AWARD

Volunteers who serve as the top leader in their program are eligible to earn the Scouter's Key Award. This award is a knot to be worn above the left pocket on the uniform. In addition to the knot is a small iconic metal pin called a "device" for each position awarded.

GUIDELINES FOR UNIT FUNDS



Unit Committees should approve bylaws that explain how funds are handled.

Tax ID Numbers	Under the Chartered Partner Concept, Chartering Organizations (churches, service clubs and community organizations) "own" the pack, troop, crew, ship and post units that are affiliated with Scouting America's program. Units are encouraged to get their federal ID number (needed to establish an account with a local bank) and sales tax exempt number from their chartered organization. They can also apply directly to the IRS or state. The SS-4 form can be downloaded from IRS.gov and mailed in. For a MN sales tax exempt number go to revenue.state.mn.us or call 1-800-657-3777. For a WI sales tax exempt number go to www.revenue.wi.gov . If you have any further questions about setting up a tax ID, please call 612-261-2426.
Reconciling Accounts	The unit committee is responsible for unit finances and a unit budget. A treasurer is recruited to administer the account and the committee chair should receive the bank statement to reconcile. All unit funds should pass through the bank account including but not limited to dues, fundraising dollars, popcorn sales income and camping fees.
Checking Accounts	Unit funds should be deposited in a checking account that requires two signatures on every check. Same-family members must not approve payment or be the second signatory. The unit leader could be one of the signers, and it is recommended that one be a committee person. Unit leaders might have a petty cash fund (with a limit set by the unit committee) which is accounted for with receipts each month. The chartered organization should audit the unit finances annually and make a report available to the membership of the chartered organization. Debit cards are discouraged, due to the lack of a second signature required.
Unit Equipment	The Chartered organization "owns" the unit, and all property and funds used by the unit remain the property of the organization as long as the Scouting America charter remains in place. A unit is an unincorporated association, not a legal entity that can bear title to property. Gifts to a unit are almost never tax deductible. An annual inventory of a unit's equipment should be given to the chartered organization. Insuring the unit's equipment is recommended. If a unit is dissolved or the charter lapses or is revoked and all efforts to reorganize have been exhausted, the chartered partner shall apply unit funds and property to the payment of unit obligations and then give the surplus to the Council or another youth-serving program, Scout unit, or agency.
Unit Accounts at the Leadership Center	Each unit can maintain an account at the Leadership Center that can be used for purchasing items at the Mounds View, Hermantown and Leadership Center Scout Shops. The account can also be used to pay for events, membership or camping fees. Committee Chairs can access the accounts through Scouting Events. To get more information on access visit www.northernstar.org/online-tools . The funds do not earn interest and the account is not allowed to go negative. Call customer service at 612-261-2300 if additional assistance is needed.
Youth Accounts	Some units allow youth to accrue portions of funds raised in an account under their name, rather than billing families that don't participate equally in the fundraiser. To prevent violation of IRS "private benefit" rules, the youth member should not earn more than 20% of the total gross from a fundraiser; the funds may only be used for Scouting purposes reflected within the scope of unit activities; and the criteria for how much "credit" they have earned should be based on Scout spirit and participation in all activities, rather than how much a Scout raised in the fundraiser. If a youth transfers to another unit, such funds can follow to the new unit, but must be transferred directly from one unit to another.

INSURANCE COVERAGE

COMPREHENSIVE GENERAL LIABILITY INSURANCE

This coverage provides primary general liability coverage for **registered** volunteer Scouters with respect to claims arising out of an official Scouting activity (as outlined in the "Guide to Safe Scouting") with the exception that the coverage is in excess over any insurance available to the volunteer for loss arising from the ownership, maintenance, or use of a motor vehicle or watercraft. This excess vehicle insurance is only available while the vehicle or watercraft is in the actual use of a Scouting unit and being used for a Scouting purpose. Coverage is for personal injury and property damage to a third party.

Due to the high limits of our coverage, volunteers should NOT be placed in a position where their assets are jeopardized because of a negligence liability claim or lawsuit. The insurance provided **unregistered** Scouting volunteers through the Scouting general liability insurance program is in addition to any other insurance the volunteer has to his or her benefit, usually a homeowner's, personal liability, or auto liability policy.

There is no coverage for those who commit intentional or criminal acts.

Automobile Liability Insurance

All vehicles **MUST** be covered by an owner's liability insurance policy. The amount of this coverage must meet or exceed the insurance requirement of the state in which the vehicle is licensed. (It is recommended that coverage limits are at least \$100,000 combined single limit.)

Any vehicle carrying 10 or more passengers is required to have limits of \$1,000,000 single limit. In the case of rented vehicles, the requirement of coverage limits can be met by combining the limits of personal coverage carried by the driver with coverage carried by the owner of the rented vehicle. All vehicles used for travel outside the United States must carry a liability insurance policy that complies with or exceeds the requirements of that country.

COUNCIL ACCIDENT AND SICKNESS INSURANCE PLAN

Secondary Accident and Sickness Insurance has been purchased by Northern Star Scouting for all packs, troops, crews and posts. This plan provides some coverage for accidental injury, illness, accidental death and dismemberment while participating in any approved and supervised Scouting activity, including going to and from meetings. Additional highlights of the council-provided coverage include:

- The policy is in excess to any other available source of medical benefits.
- The insurance plan is an excess insurance plan from the first dollar up to the plan limits.
- The policy is primary for any family or Scout with no other insurance coverage.
- New members are automatically covered as soon as their applications for membership are processed.
- Traveling to and from a unit meeting or other approved and supervised Scouting activity is covered under this plan.
- Coverage applies for injuries received while attending an approved Scouting activity or if a sickness first manifests itself while there.
- If an accident occurs, complete the current insurance claim form found on our website and file it directly with Health Special Risk Inc. at the address they provide. For your reference our Council policy number is PTPN 00327402.
- In addition, Incident Report Forms need to be completed.

Harassment Prevention Policy

It is the policy of Northern Star Scouting to maintain a Scouting environment based on respect and courtesy. The council does not tolerate harassment of our members, employees or the general public. This policy is in effect at all Scouting properties (camps and offices) and at all functions (council, district and unit meetings, activities and events). If you believe you have been harassed, or are aware of an incident of harassment of someone else, you are responsible for reporting it immediately. For details, see full policy at www.northernstar.org/forms. Thank you for your help in ensuring a positive Scouting environment for everyone.

MEDICAL EMERGENCY OR SERIOUS ACCIDENT/FATALITY

1. Seek medical help through the camp leadership, by calling 911, or other means as necessary.
2. Notify the Camp Ranger or Camp Director (if you are at a council camp).
3. Notify the Scout Executive (651-485-1711) (or Deputy Scout Executive (612-247-0270) if it is a serious accident or injury (if you are not at camp).
4. Parents should be notified through a designated council staff member when the injury is very serious.
5. Collect all information if medical care is required and submit the Incident Report Form on the next page to the Camping Department within 48 hours via email to camping@northernstar.org or fax to: 612-261-2499.

Incident Reporting

1. Notify the Camp Ranger or Camp Director (if you are at a council camp).
2. Notify the Scout Executive or Deputy Scout Executive at 612-261-2300 (if you are not at camp).
3. Collect all information and submit an **Incident Report Form** (www.northernstar.org/forms).
4. The Scout Executive will be the public voice if needed.

Reporting of Child Abuse - Anywhere

All persons involved in Scouting shall report to local authorities any good-faith suspicion or belief that any child, whether a Scout or not, is or has been physically or sexually abused, physically or emotionally neglected, exposed to any form of violence or threat, exposed to any form of sexual exploitation, including the possession, manufacture, or distribution of child pornography, online solicitation, enticement, or showing of obscene material. You may not abdicate this reporting responsibility to any other person.

Steps to Report Child Abuse - Anytime

1. Ensure the child is in a safe environment.
2. In cases of child abuse or medical emergencies, call 911 or law enforcement immediately. In addition, if the suspected abuse is in the Scout's home or family, you are required to contact the local child abuse prevention agency in the county where it occurred (see list by county in the left column).
3. Notify the Scout Executive or his/her designee (612-261-2300; other contact names and numbers below) including an anonymous tipline. This is an important step since it is possible that action must be taken by Scouting America, even if no action can be taken by law enforcement.

Reporting Violations of Scouting Youth Protection Policies

If you think any of Scouting's Youth Protection policies have been violated, even if you have no belief that abuse has occurred, you must notify the Scout Executive or his/her designee so appropriate action may be taken.

In addition to the direct contact numbers provided, to further encourage prompt reporting of any suspected violations of Youth Protection Policies or indications of possible abuse, a local toll-free Youth Protection Tipline has been created for individuals who wish to remain anonymous. Those calling this number will be able to leave a message.

Incident Report Form Instructions

Where to find the form:

1. The form and these standard procedures should be in every health lodge, camp lodge, administration building, dining hall and ranger office at our council camping properties.
2. The form can also be found in the Calendar & Resource Guide, and on the web (see link below).

When to complete the report form:

1. Any time documentation is needed for a medical or non-medical (e.g. youth protection, harassment, physical injury, council building/property damage, etc.) type situation.
2. If there is a medical emergency, seek medical help first through camp or unit leadership, by calling 911 or other means as necessary. The form is completed after any emergency incident has been dealt with by first responders.
3. Anytime personnel leave council property enroute to a medical facility due to injury.
4. In some instances, it may not be so clear when to complete this form. If you believe that an incident likely requires follow-up, then complete this form.

Who completes the report form:

1. Anyone with immediate knowledge of the situation, other witnesses (camp staff, adult leaders, Scouts, parents, etc.)
2. Form is on council web at <http://www.northernstar.org/for-members/forms-and-documents> and can be provided to parties if needed. There is an online incident reporting function on the national Scouting website at <https://www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/incident-report> either reporting method is fine.

Steps to submit the report form:

1. Upon completion, the form should be submitted to the contact listed depending on location:
 - a. Year-Round Camping at Council Camps (unit camping, district event): to Campmaster or Ranger.
 - b. Council Summer Camp/Winter Camp: to the Camp Health Officer.
 - c. Base Camp (Leadership & TeamBuilding Centers): to the Director of Camping & Properties
 - d. Non-Scouting Property (unit camping trip, meeting, etc.): to the Director of Camping & Properties
2. Route the form to Base Camp **within 48 hours** of incident occurrence. E-mail form to Camping@NorthernStar.org or fax to 612-261-2499.
3. Follow-up with any witnesses to ensure they complete a form and submit to the email or fax # in #2.

Notification of senior camp staff and/or council staff:

1. Depending on the level of incident, camp staff/camp ranger/base camp staff/council staff notification should occur once the situation is stable. If an incident form is completed at a council property, then the senior council staff person on that property should be notified of the incident. Based on the severity of the situation, senior camp/council staff may be notified.
2. Alert notifications that go **directly to the Scout Executive 651-485-1711**. As time and situation permits, notify your volunteer leadership, immediate camp staff leader or a council staff leader. Alert categories are:
 - a. Fatality or hospitalization for a life-threatening or critical condition (immediately).
 - b. Allegation or suspected sexual or non-sexual abuse of Scout (youth protection issue) including bullying or harassment.
 - c. Vehicle accident, theft, or damage with **significant** damage or loss.
 - d. Litigation anticipated.
 - e. Any local publicity or media attention.
 - f. Communicable disease breakout or mass foodborne illness.
 - g. Building or camp shut down for more than one day.
 - h. Missing youth (if not found in a reasonable amount of time).
 - i. Lost swimmer or boater (if after buddy checks the person is not found on shore).
 - j. Any threat or use of a weapon.
 - k. Any negative behavior associated with race, religion, sexual orientation, or disability.
 - l. Any mention of threats of suicide.

For other key council staff emergency contact phone numbers, reference the Calendar & Resource Guide, Procedures for serious accidents or fatalities (posted in each camp building) or Emergency Plan (posted in each building at Base Camp).
